On Tuesday 4th April, all senior students across the mallee combined for an exciting excursion in Esperance. The Junior Munmlinup students got to enjoy the entire day playing together and enjoying the peace and quiet of not having the senior students. Oscar, Hailey, and William started the day early and were driven into Esperance to begin the day. We meet up with the other schools at the tanker jetty to listen and learn from Nana Annie Dabb. The students learnt about her life growing up in Esperance and the different laws aboriginal people had to abide by in the growing town of Esperance before learning more about the local plants around the Esperance jetty and how a single plant can have up to 3-4 purposes. From eating the white parts of a plant, to smashing it out for weaving baskets or using the same plant as rope. Aboriginals ensure that they used as much of a plant or animal as they could to leave no waste. The students had recess before making the long walk to the museum (it was only 1km, but boy did they make it seem like longer). The students were then transported by from the future to Esperance. Their job was to find and report back to their future friends and selves about an object they found in the Museum. They had to report back and state what they thought the object was, how it was made and the uses of this object. Students created a video which are being collated into one massive video for students to view next term. Unfortunately, we ran out of time to play a few Numero sessions, so the students headed back to school. We made it before the students left the classroom. The journey back had lots of interesting conversations happening, especially around Canberra Camp, which is being held at the end of next term. 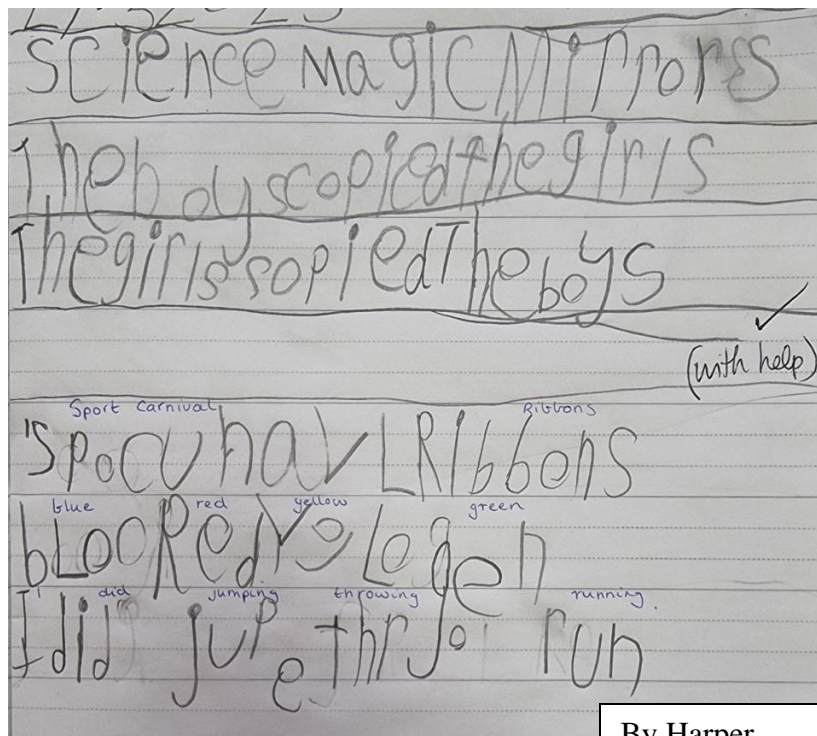
Student Reports
